Yellow Pages Phone Books

Phone books everywhere! Falling apart and making a mess on the side of the road. The timehonored method of distributing phone books in rural areas has been to leave them on the ground

Traditionally, near mailboxes. every household wanted at least one phone book, so the books were picked up. Today, most people find information using the internet. That's easier than using a phone book that divides a small population by geographical areas. The result is lots of phone books are left to decay.

Recently, some companies have been trying to distribute books more carefully. In particular, several publishers of Yellow Pages have been receptive to measures that can reduce dumping. Publishers don't want to waste books, but fundamentally they get paid for distributing books.

The belief is that paper phone books will be obsolete.

Changes in distribution are coming. Some phone companies that distribute in the Antelope Valley

> return within a week to pick up unclaimed books. Some cities are trying to limit distribution to customers who "opted in" to receive Yellow Pages. San Francisco have enacted a three-year experiment program. Under the law, which won't go into effect for a year, companies can leave the books at the front doors of residences and businesses only with

prior permission. However, distributors can make them available at high-traffic places such as community centers and grocery stores.

Free Dump Day for County Residents

As part of the County's efforts to reduce illegal dumping, Unincorporated area residents can drop off up to one ton of trash, free of charge, at Waste Management of Lancaster on October 15, 2011.

With proof of residency, such as a driver's license, residents can drop off their trash from 8 am to noon. Note: Vehicles must be in line by 11:30am, 30 minutes prior to closing of operation in order not to be turned away.

Free Dump Days are held twice a year, in April and October.

If Unincorporated area residents are unable to attend the Free

Dump Day, the following events are available throughout the year:

Free Bulky Item Drop-off: Unincorporated area residents can drop off one bulky item per year, such as a sofa, table, mattress, etc., free of charge.

Free Waste Tire Drop-off: Unincorporated

area residents can drop-off a total of four waste tires per year, free of charge.
